"I am going to send you what my Father has promised. But for now, stay in the city. Stay there until you have received power from heaven."

*Luke 24:49*

Do you like waiting? What is something you had to wait a long time for? How long did you have to wait?

When I was a kid, my brother and I loved attending church camp. We could not wait for summer to begin so we could spend a week at camp. This was our favorite week. **PRAYER:** Dear God, help us to be people who wait on you, even if it is hard, so we can receive what you have for us and share that with others. Amen.

Finally, I want all of you to agree with one another. Be understanding. Love one another. Be kind and tender. Be humble.

*1 Peter 3:8*

Have you played a sport like soccer where each team member plays a specific position, and you all work together to get the ball into the goal? Or maybe you have been on a dance or cheerleading team where everyone performs the same action at the same time. These examples of repetition, practice, and teamwork involve listening to a coach.

Peter wrote this letter to the believers in Asia Minor (and us as Christ's followers), asking them to work together and imitate Jesus's actions and attitudes. The ultimate goal is to become more like Jesus, meaning we focus on others. Imagine if everyone on the dance or sports team decided not to work together; they would trip over each other, create chaos, and ultimately miss the goal. The Bible reminds us to leave our selfish desires and perform as a team. Team members rely on coaches to show them better techniques as they realize the team's potential in showcasing their strengths and minimizing their weaknesses. Treating each other with kindness builds a great team.

Can you think of a way to partner with other Christians as a team to bless others? How can you practice becoming more like Christ in your actions and attitudes?

In today's verse, we celebrate that through faith in Jesus, we receive the promise of the Holy Spirit! This promise is a special gift from God. Spending time in God's Word as a family can be challenging. During the years we have our kids at home, our lives are busy with sports, gymnastics, band, choir, school, church activities, and more. Sometimes we might not know where to start or what resource to use. And then, what happens when we miss one or a few days in a row? How will we ever catch up? We understand these challenges, and we hope the Half-Million Mobilization *Family Devotional* is a helpful spiritual tool for your family.

There are times throughout the year when working through a short Bible study is more doable. We have found this to be true in our family. The important thing is to create a rhythm and intentionality with learning and engaging in spiritual conversations together. Short studies like these can be a great start for those who desire these special family times and aren't sure where to begin. Our family knows from experience that life happens, and we may miss a day or two of the plan. We encourage you to pick up where you left off and keep going! These times can be as flexible as they need to be; some days it may look like a conversation around the dinner table and other times it may look like a conversation in the car on the way home from a ballgame.

Give praise to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.  
He has blessed us with every spiritual blessing.  
Those blessings come from the heavenly world.  
They belong to us because we belong to Christ.

*Ephesians 1:3*

Have you ever put on someone else's glasses, a funny pair, or even ones with colored lenses? It changes how you see things. Suddenly, things may look funny, out of focus, wavy, multi-colored, or maybe everything looks larger than it is. Today, let's put on our spiritual blessing glasses and name all the blessings God has given us. God's blessings are all around us. How many can you count?

Today's scripture tells us to give God praise for each of his many blessings. What blessings can you see, smell, taste, or touch, like people, nature, shelter, or food? What about blessings you experience, like love, peace, kindness, or emotions? Think about the spiritual blessings God has given us: saving us from our sins, forgiveness, etc. Can blessings be found in things that are difficult or not pleasant? What would those be? For an added challenge, become a blessing investigator and ask other family and friends what blessings they would like to praise God for. This could spark an idea you did not think of.

Good things can distract us from noticing God's blessings. We become so busy with homework, sports, clubs, and relationships. Taking time to stop and focus on God helps us to realize how blessed we are.

**PRAYER:** Dear Jesus, thank you for all the blessings you give me. Please help me not to be so distracted that I forget to praise you for all your gifts of blessing.

Have you ever been the “new kid”? Maybe at a new school, church, or team? It can be exciting at first, but once you get to the door, your stomach turns and you might feel a little nervous, right?

I remember when I moved from Texas to Virginia when I was in 5th grade. My parents took me to my new school and I didn’t know a single person. I was terrified! My mom told me, “Don’t be afraid! God is with you and He will protect you”. Then my dad said, “Put your little hand in God’s *big* hand!” It was as if they were quoting today’s Bible verse to me!

Overcoming fear is possible with God’s guidance!

*Mark 10:45*

Who are some of the heroes you can name? Maybe there is a hero in your favorite streaming show or in a book you've read. Heroes are people who spend their time serving and helping take care of others. Sometimes they even give up what they want so that other people's needs are met.

Did you know that as Christians we have a hero? When Jesus came to earth as a person, he lived his whole life in perfect holiness—loving God and loving others. The blessing of honest people builds up a city. But the works of sinners destroy it.

*Proverbs 11:11*

Have you ever spent lots of time building or creating something, and someone came along and destroyed your creation? Maybe they laughed or made fun of you or what you made. Which takes longer: building something or destroying it? Why does it take longer? Our words and our actions either make people feel better or feel awful.

The choices we make with our actions and words can either bless or criticize others. Our tongues may be a small part of our bodies, but they can help, hurt, support, or destroy. I wonder what the world would be like if we treated everyone with love, kindness, compassion, and forgiveness instead of hatred, jealousy, judgment, and unforgiveness. Our words and actions either build others up or tear others' feelings down. How would God want us to treat others?

**PRAYER:** Dear Jesus, thank you for blessing me. Please help me to choose words and actions that build others up and be a blessing. Amen.

*Numbers 6:24-26*

Jesus replied, " 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul. Love him with all your mind.' This is the first and most important commandment. And the second is like it. 'Love your neighbor as you love yourself.' Everything that is written in the Law and the Prophets is based on these two commandments."

*Matthew 22:37-40*

A lot of heroes in stories often have someone who teaches them how to be a hero. Call that person a guide, a mentor, or someone who has been a hero a long time! That guide teaches the hero everything they need to know about how to be a hero.

For Christians, Jesus is our hero! He showed us how to use our "super power," also known as: love. Jesus loved God and loved others, and because Jesus *is* God, Jesus loved God and others perfectly! Throughout his entire life, Jesus showed us what it meant to love God by obeying God, caring about others, and teaching them about who God is and what God has done, is doing, and will do one day!

Jesus also showed love to the people around him. He cared about the people who were sick, poor, needing encouragement and help, and by challenging them to follow after God with everything they have!

That's what Matthew 22:37-40 is talking about when it says to love God with all your heart, soul, and mind. Jesus is basically saying, "Love God with all of you!" Jesus showed his love for us by dying on the cross and coming back to life three days later. How can you show love to someone in your life today?

I will give you new hearts. I will give you a new spirit that is faithful to me. I will remove your stubborn hearts from you. I will give you hearts that obey me. I will put my Spirit in you. I will make you want to obey my rules. I want you to be careful to keep my laws.

*Ezekiel 36:26-27*

What if a hero decided *not* to save the day? What if they refused to help the people who needed help?

- Go around the room and share what you think would happen if a hero refused to save the day!

Jesus was not a stubborn hero. He knew what he had come to do: show us how to love God and love others and then defeat sin and death by dying on the cross and coming back to life three days later. Jesus was faithful to do what he had come to do! He had a willing heart.

God promises in Ezekiel 36:26-27 that when we come to him, he will give us “new” hearts! He transforms us into someone like Jesus: willing to serve and love God and others. He takes that stubborn, selfish heart out of us and replaces it with a heart that is willing to obey him!

Sometimes we get stubborn and don’t *want* to be loving to our siblings who might bother us. Or we might not *want* to be kind to the new kid in our class at school. But God has called us to be like the greatest hero: Jesus, who didn’t refuse to love others. He said yes to loving God and loving others always!

**PRAYER:** Holy Spirit, give us willing hearts to love God and love others always. Change us from the inside out to be more and more like Jesus!

“I will make you into a great nation. And I will bless you. I will make your name great. You will be a blessing to others.”

*Genesis 12:2*

Think about a time when someone made a promise to you or you made a promise to someone else. What was the promise? And most importantly, did you or that person follow through on the promise? Promises should not be made without thought. Sometimes they are broken and we find ourselves sad or disappointed. The good news is when God makes a promise, he always keeps his promises. He blesses us, and we can bless others by our actions.

Today’s Bible passage is part of a covenant promise God made with the prophet Abraham. A covenant is like a promise but even more certain; it is a commitment to something or someone that will happen no matter what! Look at the verse above. How many times does God say “I will...”? God then turns his attention to Abraham and says, “You will...” God commits to making good on his promise to Abraham. The fulfillment of the promise would abundantly bless Abraham, and then Abraham would bless others because of God’s blessing.

God’s promises are reliable. When we make promises to others, we should keep them. So next time, when a family member asks us to promise to help around the house or do something with or for them, we should follow through as a blessing.

**PRAYER:** Dear Jesus, thank you for keeping your promises. Help me keep my promises to others and to be a blessing, so they can bless others, too. Amen.

Be kind and tender to one another. Forgive one another, just as God forgave you because of what Christ has done.

*Ephesians 4:32*

Ever heard it said, “do to others what you would have them do to you”? That’s *the Golden Rule*. Once, when I was in trouble as a kid, I remember telling my dad, “They were mean to me so that’s how they wanted to be treated!” It’s easy to make excuses for being mean, impatient, and rude.

But Jesus, after washing the disciples feet at Passover (John 13) said we should treat others the way *he* would treat them. Wow! What should we call that? *The Diamond Rule*? That could work, since sometimes diamonds need to be dug out, cut, and polished. What if that’s what *the Diamond Rule* does? When we are kind and gentle with “another” like today’s verse says, we’re following Jesus’s example and we’re also being shaped and polished to be the best version of ourselves.

Diamonds “catch” and redirect light. Instead of catching bad attitudes and habits and making excuses, let’s follow *the Diamond Rule*. Let’s catch God’s goodness, forgiveness, and kindness, and also spread it around to others!

**PRAYER:** God, help me to treat others the way you would treat them. Help me to accept and experience your forgiveness and love and then spread them to others. Let me not to settle for excuses, but make me more like you. Amen.

*Luke 22:27*

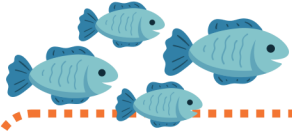

Even heroes have to take a break sometimes to rest and recharge! If a hero kept going and going and going, even they would get tired at some point; unless they had a Never-Get-Tired super power!

But we don't have that super power! In fact, God calls us to be still, to pause, and to rest. In John 21:12-13, Jesus has breakfast with the disciples. This took place after Jesus had died on the cross and come back to life three days later. Jesus rested with the disciples and they spent time together.

We have really busy lives with school and practice and having fun with our families! But sometimes we need to pause, slow down, and sit with Jesus. When we take time to rest, we can remember who God is and all that God has done for us. We can say thank you to God for all the good things he has done in our lives and ask him for help with the things that bother us.

Today, take some time to slow down, sit down, and rest. As you rest, talk to God about your day and what you've been up to. Spend some time with Jesus just like the disciples did at breakfast on the beach!

*John 13:14-15*

Have you ever had dirty, stinky feet? Maybe you were playing soccer or another sport and got really sweaty. Ew! Maybe you were playing outside and splashed in a mud puddle. I bet you needed a bath afterwards!

Jesus once had a dirty, stinky foot situation on his hands! He was sitting down to an evening meal with his disciples and decided to show them an example of how to serve one another. He got a towel, a basin, and began to go around washing his disciples feet! In those days, people walked barefoot or with sandals so you can imagine how dusty and smelly they were! But Jesus did it to show an example of how to take care of and serve people around us. Even Jesus, the Son of God, was willing to do a dirty, stinky task to care for his friends.

What kinds of tasks can you do for others—things that nobody really *wants* to do? (Examples: take out the trash, fold a sibling's clothes, wash the dishes, dust the furniture, pick up litter). Serve someone you care about this week by doing a task so they don't have to!

**PRAYER:** Dear Jesus, thank you for showing us how to love others by serving them. Help us to follow your example and show love by helping someone this week! Amen.

We all get tired. That’s why we sleep each night! Our bodies need rest each day in order to help us through the next day. Sometimes when we work hard on something like cleaning our room or helping with the dishes or other chores, we might get tired too.

In Matthew 11:28-29 Jesus calls everyone who is tired to come to him. Jesus doesn’t mean everyone who is sleepy, but Jesus means everyone who is ready to trust in God, instead of trusting in themselves.

We can tire ourselves out because we choose to trust in ourselves instead of trusting in God for help. We might think we can do everything, but the truth is, we need God. If we keep trying to do everything in life on our own without God’s help, we will get very, very tired! That’s who Jesus is calling out to: anyone who is tired and needs rest.

Jesus is good; he is the greatest hero! He wants to help us throughout our lives. When we’re tired, when we’re excited, when we’re sad, when we’re unsure, Jesus is always with us, calling us to trust in him for help.

This scripture shows us that Jesus wants us to copy the Samaritan. Just like the Samaritan showed love and kindness to a man that he wasn't even friends with, Jesus wants us to show love and kindness to everyone. God calls us to be a hero in the name of Jesus.

*Luke 10:34–35*

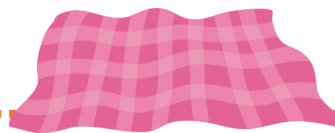

*Psalm 116:5*

*Ephesians 3:10-11*

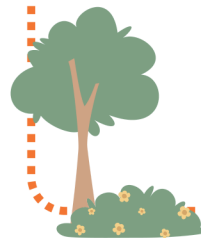
